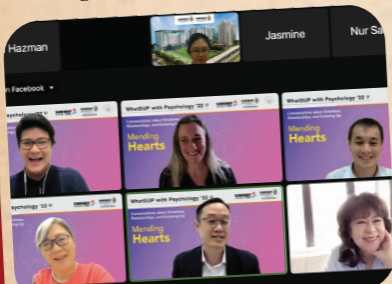

Who and what is 'civil society'?

"Civil society is a very big category. In a way, it's all the rest."

It includes all of the following:

- religious institutions and congregations
- universities
- non-governmental organisations (NGO)
- community organisations
- and each of us as citizens, consumers, potential activists

Civil Society, Government and the SDGs

The role of civil society is **to hold the government accountable**

How civil society can ensure that the government is accountable?

Through **SDG metrics, data and indicators**. Those information can be used for **quantification, benchmarking, comparison, identification of best practices, backcasting**, to assess how the government is doing in terms of achieving the SDG goals in the year 2030, or the Paris Climate Agreement in the year 2050.

Investment Activism

When shareholders use their power as shareholders to put forward **propositions to the management** of the companies on how the company should change their behavior

Case Study

ExxonMobil

In the case of Exxon Mobil, some shareholders put forward a **shareholder resolution** that called on the Exxon Mobil managers to report on how climate change and climate change policies would affect the situation of Exxon Mobil

However, the Exxon Mobil managers didn't want to do that, saying that they were managing the company just fine.

Case Study

Due to this, the huge money management firm, **Blackrock**, which invests a massive amounts of pension fund money into the corporate sector **decided to vote for the climate action** in the shareholder resolution.

In the end of the day, despite the opposition of Exxon Mobil's management, **62% of Exxon shareholders voted for the climate resolution.**

Case Study

The Role of Civil Society in Pursuing Legal Reform

The Tobacco Industry

Many individuals suffering from lung cancer and other cancers, have sued the tobacco industry.

The tobacco industry responded in defense that it could not be proved that the particular plaintiff's lung cancer was caused by cigarettes because people get lung cancer even if they are nonsmokers.

But the courts have said that the statistical evidence is sufficiently strong that the tobacco use raises the likelihood of cancer so much that even though an individual case cannot be proved a irrevocably and, with certainty to be caused by smoking, just the statistical association is enough to find culpability of the tobacco company.

SUNWAY UNIVERSITY RANKED #1 NON-GOVERNMENT LINKED UNIVERSITY PRIVATE UNIVERSITY IN MALAYSIA



The Times Higher Education (THE) World University Rankings 2023 brings Sunway University to the 801-1000 ranking, being the No.1 non-government linked university (GLU) private university in Malaysia and ranked as one of Malaysia's Top 10 universities.

The University was also ranked in Business & Management at #301 – 400; and Physical Sciences at #601 – 800. THE World University Rankings is the largest and most diverse university rankings.

The table is calibrated carefully with 13 performance indicators that measure an institution's performance across four areas: teaching, research, knowledge transfer and international outlook. The compiled data produce

these rankings that are trusted by governments and universities, which are a vital source for students when they are making decisions about where to study.

In addition, Sunway University is also the top-ranked private university in Malaysia for THE Impact Rankings 2021 and 2022. THE Impact Rankings recognise universities worldwide for their social and economic impact based on the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.

The UN SDSN proudly launched the newest Secretariat office in Sunway University, Malaysia, which will serve as SDSN's Asia Headquarters, one of only three such global centers, alongside Paris and New York City.

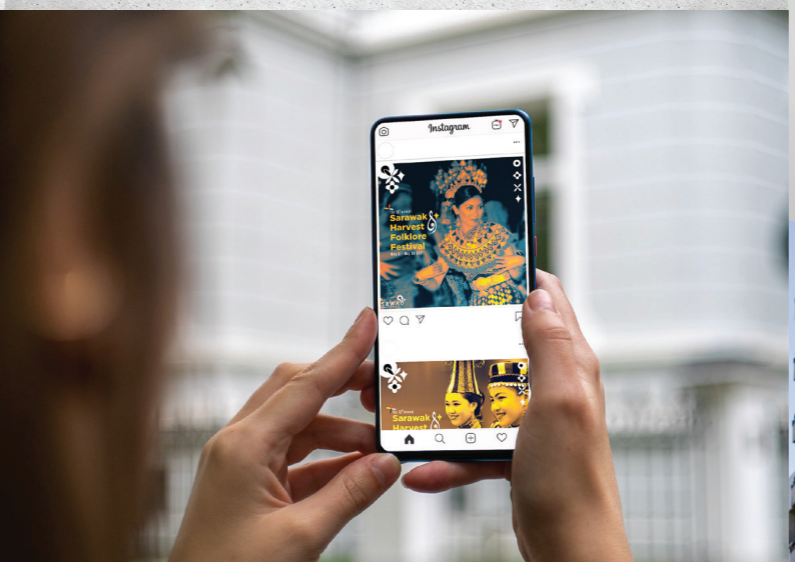
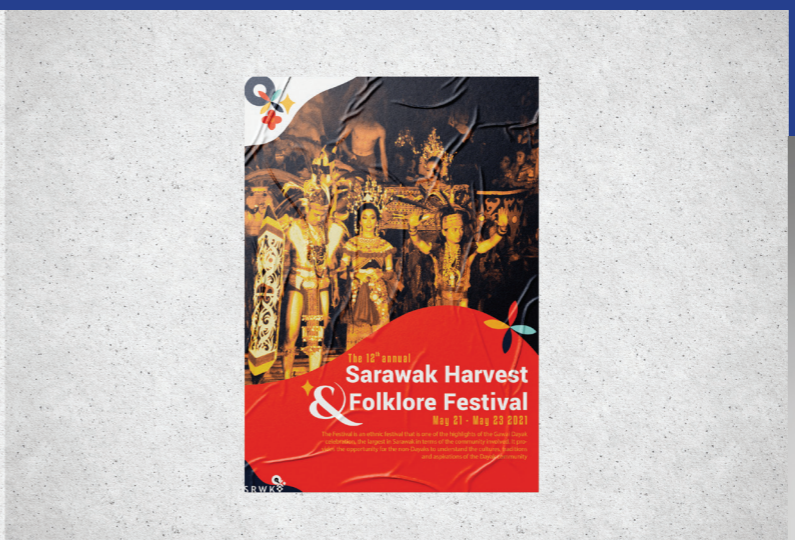

Artisanal Bakeries in Subang and KL

1/ CROISSERIE ARTISAN BAKERY



Some claim that Croisserie Artisan Bakery serves up some of the best croissants in KL. This neighbourhood bakery is an underrated gem that has garnered a steady stream of loyal patrons that keep coming back for their consistently-delicious pastries, cakes and breads.

Located in Damansara Heights, it was first established in 2015 to bring

freshly baked goods into households. They use only the finest ingredients and practice the authentic baking technique called Respectus Panis. A wide variety of breads and pastries are baked in small batches daily, without the use of artificial improver and preservatives, to guarantee the freshness and quality of their products.

Some of the must try products besides their famed croissants include the pain au chocolat, quiches, canéles, various types of danishes and madeleines. Do check out their spring onions

chicken tartine, a special combination of roasted chicken and spring onion on baguette - it's beyond imagination. The cakes come in big sizes which are ideal for a celebration, and in small sizes which are the perfect personal-size treat to accompany your hot coffee or tea.



With the modern contemporary interior, every corner of the shop is Instagram-worthy. O'coffee club, an international coffee chain is also linked directly to Croisserie, which means that customers can now order a coffee with their pastries.

2/ DOU DOU BAKE

Nestled in a quiet corner of Petaling Jaya, Dou Dou Bake offers home-baked sourdough breads, croissants, and other pastries, all fermented and baked without any shortcuts.

The bakery takes pride in their flaky and buttery sourdough croissants, made fresh daily. Other popular items include their kaffir lime drizzle loaf, portobello mushroom danish and chocolate tart made with their homemade chocolate sauce. Besides pastries, they also sell breakfast sets. We highly recommend trying their big breakfast, the texture of their runny scrambled eggs seasoned with a light sprinkle of sea salt add such a unique taste and all of the elements on the dish go hand-in-hand with the sourdough bread.

The roasted beans offer a noticeable smoothness and the varieties available lend truth to their motto of being a 'coffee temple'. The bakery interior is a raw expression of modern aesthetics and the ambience is calm despite the bustling flow of customers coming in and out.



3/ GOOD GROUND BAKERY



The sweet smell of fresh pastries and the calming scent of tea wafts through the air while light chatter spills through the small cracks of pleasant silence, making it perfect for one to fantasise their own romantic day with a cup of chamomile tea and a warm slice of banana loaf.

Along SS17/1A, one can find the traditional bakery filled with tarts, croissants, cakes, cookies and many more delectable baked goods to savour. Established back in 2019, the bakery has now grown into a cherished hideout for locals to dine-in and soak in the tranquillity it has to offer. Sarah Yeoh, the owner of the bakery is the mastermind behind the ever-changing menu of the bakery. Each baked product is crafted with love and care to wow the socks off of every customer.

They have a variety of croissants such as sausage onion, pistachio apricot, matcha raspberry and of course, chocolate. Some of their bestsellers are the banana loaf, which is one hundred percent a comfort pastry, their sea salt brownie, which is just divine and their chicken leek pie, a recent addition to their widely spread menu.

Along with sweet and savoury desserts, they have a wide range of drinks from freshly brewed coffee to aromatic tea to ease one's mind. For vegetarians, their mushroom quiche and pesto roast vege sandwich are a must try.



4/ LITTLEPEOPLE CO

Tucked in between concrete and factories, you will be astonished to find this cosy little coffee shop with wonderful bakes and brews.

While many bakeries prefer to stick to the traditional flavours for their baked goods, Littlepeople co takes it one step further by coming up with their own twists on freshly baked pastries. Be sure to try out their Burnt Butter Sourdough Chocolate Chunks Cookie with Maldon Sea Salt, where the chocolate melts the moment it's in your mouth or the Ham & Cheese croissant, which has crispy burnt cheese around it which adds flavour to the already buttery croissant. The menu may be concise, but the variations added create more joy to the taste buds!



The coffee shop is also known for their brews. The coffee beans used vary from month-to-month, originating from different countries such as Cambodia and Brazil. The baristas are also enthusiastic and confident enough to help customers find the coffee that best satisfies their taste buds.

The ground floor of the coffee shop is filled with about 5 seating areas for pairs in little camping chairs. There is also a high table for a larger group of people and charging sockets for electronic devices available around the seating areas. The upper floor is an open space covered with a glass ceiling which allows customers to bask in the sunlight while enjoying the calm environment.

An advocate for this cycle or circle of contributing is Zohrab Chong Aik Shuen, Sunway-Monash Twinning Programme alumnus. It was the year 1990 and Zohrab began his studies with Sunway College – when everything was fairly new. Zohrab wanted to pursue a double degree in Australia, and Sunway was the pioneer in partnering with a reputable university overseas.

HOW IT ALL BEGAN

As the programme was new and small, Zohrab only had two full time lecturers who made sure to drill their students well enough to get them to advance to Australia. He recalls his time with Mrs Lim Tiew Ming who just retired recently. She made learning fun, was always jovial and they created a bond through the Hokkien dialect. A mother figure to the students, Zohrab would still keep in touch and meet up with Mrs Lim at alumni gatherings and whenever he visited the campus.

The other person whom Zohrab connected well with was Ms Lee Siok Ping, currently the Director of Student LIFE, Sunway University. Zohrab was serving in the Student Council which enabled him to work closely with the Student Services Department (now known as Student LIFE). As the advisor of the Student Council, Ms Lee was often involved and provided valuable input on the events and activities the council was planning.

As Zohrab progressed to Monash University, Australia, he founded the Sunway-Monash Programme student club. It was the first Sunway club to be registered and funded by the university itself. As students moved to Australia in their second year, they did not receive any orientations and had to find their way on their own. Hence the purpose of the club. They assisted by organising dedicated orientations for new Sunway-Monash students to help show them around for Asian groceries, food, transport, housing and books. Zohrab also served with the Monash University International Student Service where he met various people from the Chancellor to other international students.

It was through all these experiences and encounters that gave Zohrab the confidence, ability and capability which has transferred to today. This also influenced his spirit of giving back to society and nurturing the next generation.

Zohrab began mentoring since his university days and has not stopped. In his previous career, he was first a mentee and then served as a mentor to young high potential talents in guiding them through their career. He was also leading the Young Managers Think Tank of the General Insurance Association for four years with the aim to promote and grow the careers of young managers.

Zohrab is also currently volunteering as a mentor under the Sunway Mentoring Programme, an initiative by the Alumni Relations team. The programme, which began in 2013 with only 9 pairs of mentors and mentees, connects Sunway students with experienced alumni to support the students' professional growth. Zohrab, who has been a mentor for three years, is now part of a cohort of 150 mentors in 2022.

Apart from guiding people and their careers, Zohrab has also served in his township residents' association since 2012. He took on various roles from committee member, Deputy President and President which focused on community well-being, security and harmony. Together with the association, he led the digital transformation journey to create awareness of the COVID-19 situation, a food bank initiative as well as a community garden space for the residents and more.

DO'S AND DON'TS

Lunar New Year 2023 falls on January 22, celebrating the Year of the Water Rabbit! Chinese people believe that as the Spring Festival is the start of a new year, what you do then will affect your luck in the coming year. 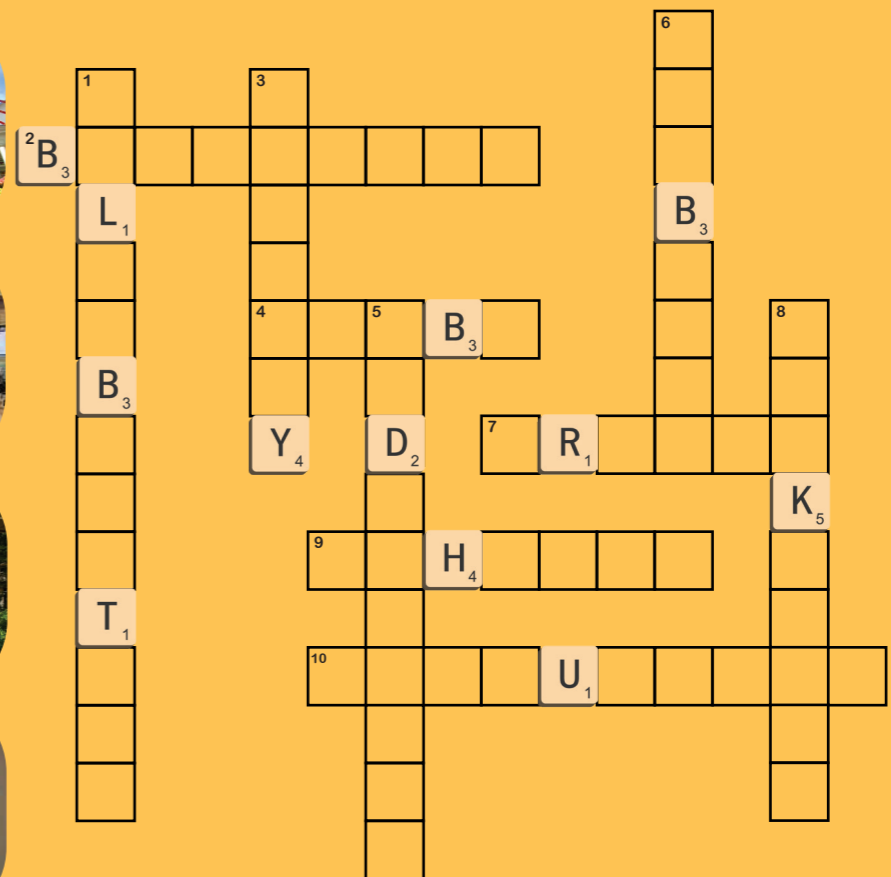
