



IN GRADUATE **EMPLOYABILITY** FOR THREE CONSECUTIVE YEARS

Sunway University has been awarded the number one position in the Graduate Employability Index among all universities in Malaysia by Talentbank for a third consecutive year. The University received 6 Stars Employability Rating in 25 different fields of study including Accounting, Actuarial Science, Engineering, Hospitality Management and many more. The recognition provides confidence for school leavers and parents who are considering university options with employability upon graduating as essential priority.

Talentbank's National Graduate Employability Index functions as a benchmark to measure the employability of graduates of higher education establishments in Malaysia. The recent survey assesses the preferred recruitment choices of employers, focusing on some key questions such as employer's opinion on their preferred universities, the number of graduates hired from these universities, and whether the employers will continue to hire graduates from the same universities they had previously chosen.

Professor Sibrandes Poppema, President of Sunway University said, "Sunway University

considers this prestigious award as the most important recognition of the unwavering dedication and excellence of our faculty, staff, and students to achieve the best possible preparation for employment. 

From Pen to Print: A Journey into Malaysia's Publishing Industry

Sunlight filters through glass windows, casting golden hues on rows of bookshelves, each hiding literary wonders waiting to be discovered. The air hums with gentle whispers of manuscripts and the rustle of pages, a symphony of stories longing to be told. Editors, designers, and writers huddle in quiet corners, the raw essence of an author's thoughts is transformed into ink and paper in this sanctuary.

The publishing industry reveals a reality that is far from the glittering portrayals we often imagine. Amidst the glimmers of success are countless rejection letters and sleepless nights that serve as reminders of the arduous publication journey. The publishing industry is



a testament to the resilience and unwavering passion of those who embrace the difficulties and intricacies of bringing words to life.

WHAT IS PUBLISHING?



Publishing involves creating and disseminating written works to the public. It involves editors refining manuscripts, designers navigating the balance between creativity and market expectations, marketing teams striving to distinguish products in a saturated market, and publishers facing financial uncertainties and adapting to evolving reader preferences.

Traditionally, established publishing houses were responsible for selecting and publishing books. Manuscripts were chosen based on market trends and their quality. However, the introduction of digital platforms and selfpublishing has broadened authors' options to release their work.

THE EVOLUTION OF MALAYSIA'S PUBLISHING INDUSTRY

In the early 1800s, Malaysia's first publishing initiatives began with the Translation Bureau of Sultan Idris College to produce public reading materials and books for Malay schools. The National Book Council of Malaysia (NBCM) was established in 1968, and the Malaysian Book Publishers Association (MABOPA) represents genuine publishers. Since then, the National Book Policy has recognised the book industry as a necessary industry, and the government's support has made publishing and printing key contributors to Malaysia's economy.

Locally published books in Malaysia primarily focus on educational resources and non-fiction, with a limited selection of English novels. Aspiring authors face challenges in the publishing industry.

What inspired you to start writing and how did you navigate the publishing process?

In my second year of university, I pitched an idea about Malaysian international schools and was accepted for a publishing programme. Inspired by my grandmother's experiences, I wrote a book on language barriers and self-acceptance. My second book focused on sports culture and perfectionism. I self published shortly after gaining some experience in the publishing industry.

What were some of the biggest challenges you faced and how did you overcome them?

I was fortunate to find an opportunity to convey my vision to cover designers, overcoming challenges in Photoshop and distribution. I was also grateful for the supportive social media community that helped me overcome obstacles in the second book.

Did you pursue traditional publishing or selfpublishing? What factors influenced your decision and what were the advantages or disadvantages you experienced with your chosen path?

I chose hybrid publishing, a mix of traditional publishing with a professional team and self-publishing where I owned all rights. Having a professional team and guidance helped a lot given my busy schedule of classes and national swimming competitions. However, I did face a lack of post-publishing support.

Were there any significant revisions or rejections you encountered along the way? How did you handle rejection or feedback and how did it shape your writing?

I had early knowledge of the story's beginning, end, and characters, and faced no rejections in my first book due to self-publishing. I sought and welcomed feedback from beta readers and readers to improve the story.

In what ways can readers support local authors? There's a lot to improve in the publishing industry. I think a main one is removing the discrimination against self-published authors. I hope distributors and bookstores would also stop categorising local writers in the Asian Fiction instead of their own genre, as if they can't exist beyond being an Asian who writes fiction. Readers can support authors by buying their books and following their social media because even seeing comments or receiving messages will help authors more than you know. Also, telling your friends to support local authors will help a lot!

Lastly, what advice would you give to aspiring authors who are starting their own journey towards publication? Keep writing from the heart. Gain confidence first before diving into this crazy world because once you put your work out there, it doesn't belong to you but to the readers. You have to be okay with not everyone liking your story. As long as you keep true to yourself and your writing, then you can make it. A lesson is to read over your contracts carefully and to not be afraid to ask questions or negotiate. Aside from your friends and family, make sure you have beta readers and strangers to read your work before you publish. Be open, be kind, and share stories that uplift the world.

How involved were you in the cover design and marketing aspects of your book? Did you have any input or control over these elements, and how important do you believe they are in the overall success of a book?

I think covers are crucial for a book's success. I was very much involved in the cover design and marketing for my first book, House of Koi. We focused on a soft blue cover design and utilised social media to reach readers. The Malaysian book community helped us find readers, and the second book allowed me to share my journey.

Can you share any memorable or surprising moments from your publishing journey? Is there a particular achievement that stands out to you?

Memorable moments include reaching MPH

- bestselling list twice with House of Koi, and
- having a sold-out book launch for Duet Me Not,
- as well as a pre-order exclusive edition.

Is there anything you would have done differently in terms of your approach to publishing or promoting your work? No, because I wouldn't be where I am without having to learn and navigate the industry, especially in Malaysia. If I did know what I know now, there's still hardly anything different I'd do because there aren't many choices in the publishing industry.

How do you see the future of publishing evolving, and what advice would you give to authors navigating these changes?

I haven't started this journey for that long. I was in and out of the publishing industry, having to focus on graduating and getting a corporate job. I think people are becoming more open to self-publishing and selling their books on their own instead of relying on publishers. My advice would be to believe in yourself and your story, and to not let anyone tell you your worth.

PHAM2024 Successfully Held at Sunway Campus

The 2024 Planetary Health Summit and 6th Annual Meeting (PHAM 2024), co-hosted by Sunway Centre for Planetary Health (SCPH) and Planetary Health Alliance, was successfully held at Sunway campus in April 2024. Themed "From Evidence to Action: Confronting Reality," the Summit emphasised the imperative to translate scientific research into tangible solutions.

Professor Tan Sri Dr. Jemilah Mahmood, Executive Director of Sunway Centre for Planetary Health said, "Bringing the Planetary Health Summit to Asia and to Malaysia this vear meant that we could demonstrate our commitment to planetary health, while learning from and sharing our experiences with others – all in pursuit of a more liveable planet and good health for all living things on Earth."

On another note, SCPH has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with WWF-Malaysia (World Wide Fund for Nature Malaysia) to tackle environmental and public health challenges. By combining expertise and resources, Sunway and WWF-Malaysia shall work towards promoting planetary health awareness and related initiatives from community to global levels.

Additionally, SCPH has partnered with Pacific Disaster Centre (PDC) to address the impact of disasters on human health and ecological systems, leveraging their expertise and data-driven approaches to mitigate disaster risks and build resilience.

Professor Sibrandes Poppema, President of Sunway University said "I am pleased to sign these MOUs of the Sunway Centre for Planetary Health with WWF-Malaysia and with Pacific Disaster Centre, both organisations that walk the talk towards a planet that is healthier than today for the benefit of a population that will also be healthier than today".

"We are honoured to forge these strategic partnerships that solidify our commitment to a healthier planet. By working together with WWF-Malaysia and PDC, we can amplify our collective impact in tackling critical planetary health challenges," Professor Tan Sri Dr. Jemilah Mahmood concluded.

As the successful event was brought to a close, we are reminded to be united in our dedication to protecting our planet. Together, students and staff can make a significant impact through collective action and shared responsibility. Let's continue to work together towards a sustainable future for all.



attanta Malaysia's Harvest Festivals

Pesta Kaamatan

The term "Kaamatan" comes from the Kadazandusun language, meaning "harvest festival." It is a significant event for the Kadazandusun community, marking a time to give thanks for the rice harvest and seek blessings for future yields.

Usually held throughout May, Pesta Kaamatan peaks on 30 and 31 May, though celebrations can extend into early June in some places.

Kaamatan is celebrated by the Kadazandusun people of Sabah and is closely tied to their native belief system, Momolianism, where the earth is seen as a divine gift. Gratitude is shown to the creator after each harvest.

In their culture, Kaamatan commemorates Huminodun's sacrifice. The daughter of Kinoringan sacrificed herself to save humanity during a famine. Her body transformed into food and crops, ensuring survival for humankind.

Although Kaamatan lasts all of May, the end date is determined by the Bobohizan, the Kadazan priestess, and it is a public holiday.

Activities such as traditional performances, competitions, beauty pageants, as well as arts and crafts, are celebrated during this festive period, showcasing the rich cultural heritage of the Kadazandusun community in Sabah.

Hari Gawai


Hari Gawai or Gawai Dayak, observed on 1 June by the Dayak people in Sarawak, is primarily a Thanksgiving festival that expresses gratitude for abundant harvests and celebrates unity while looking forward to future opportunities.

The food and drinks during Gawai festivities are integral to the celebration, embodying the essence of "merrymaking," as indicated by the literal meaning of "Gawai" in the Iban language.

On Gawai eve, the Iban community engages in miring, a ceremony of thanksgiving and blessings, characterised by offerings made to departed ancestors, spirits, and deities.

The longhouses undergo repair using timber sourced from nearby reserve forests and are decorated with ukir murals portraying wildlife motifs.

Cultural activities during Gawai include cockfighting, blowpipe demonstrations, beauty pageants, martial arts demonstrations, and dancing competitions, all contributing to the festive atmosphere.



Seeding Sustainability by Empowering Communities

Aspiring to reduce the amount of food waste that ends up at the landfill, Facilities Services has been collaborating closely with Sunway Material Smart Science & Engineering Cluster (SMS2E) since July 2022. Some of the initiatives taken by Facilities include educating relevant stakeholders such as our tenants and vendors on reducing food waste, as well as proactively collecting dry food waste from the cafeteria tenants to be composted.

Demonstrating a strong commitment towards Goal 12 of United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) – Responsible Consumption and Production – these efforts have played a pivotal role in diverting as much as 4% waste from the landfill to date.

To foster community engagement, the team also identified an impactful opportunity to involve our local communities by sharing our organic compost with the Community Herb Garden from USJ 17/2 and the USJ 11 Kebun Community. Assisted by Ms Celine Tan, a lecturer from the General Studies Department, a total of 250kg of compost were distributed - 150 kg to USJ 17/2 and 100kg to USJ 11 communities respectively.

This simple yet impactful collaboration is also in line with SDG 11 – Sustainable Cities and Communities – and marks a significant stride forward towards promoting sustainability by fostering a sense of shared responsibility for the planet. Sunway University hopes to continue leading by example, inspiring positive change both locally and beyond to create a greener, more sustainable future for all.


