A century of **FASHION**

No matter what changes humanity has gone through, fashion has been a constant throughout time. The trends which course through history reflect the nature and likes of humans who utilise clothing as a form of self-expression. Let us travel back in time to have a glimpse of fashion's evolution through the ages.

In the wake of the Great
Depression and the rise of
Hollywood, fashion in America
saw changes in broad,
sweeping strokes - washing
away the reckless freedom of
the Roaring 20s with a slight
return in conservatism.

As opposed to the almostboyish styles of the 1920s, the 1930s signed in an era of feminine elegance, with a heavy focus on slinky, outlined figures and silhouettes.

The ideal figure was a slender, long torso with wide shoulders. One such fashion trend that highlighted said figures was the 'bias cut', made popular by designer Madeleine Vionnet, which involved cutting the dress fabric 45 degrees against its weave, making the fabric skim over the wearer's curves.

As for daywear, the 1930s ushered in an era of romanticism – with clothing littered with prints of polka dots, plaid, and floral patterns hitting the streets. The look of exaggerated shoulders was also heavily popularised in this era, with suits and dresses alike adorned with padding, embellishments, and extra layers to achieve the look.

Following the economic recession, it is also important to note that fashion became far more affordable in the 1930s: while people used to buy copies of Paris fashion pieces and resell them for a high price, cheaper and simpler copies of said pieces were now being produced and sold at a much lower price.

Wild and Free

The 1960s ushered in a complete change in the world of fashion. During the early years of the decade, fashion trends remained relatively formal, being greatly influenced by the first lady of the United States of America at the time, Jacqueline Kennedy. With her well-put-together style and ladylike glamour, Kennedy's outfits (from the boxy-skirt suits to the sheaths, to the A-line dresses, paired with her signature white gloves and pearls) were admired worldwide.

Although, moving into the mid-60s, the movement of "The Swinging Sixties" bore its influence more, with youth, music, and fashion hitting an all-time high alongside the rising popularity of bands like The Beatles.

Mary Quant was the defining designer of the decade. Opening her store "Bazaar", Quant created simple and colourful mix-and-match designs that had an almost childish air to them, rejecting the prim and proper styles of the previous decades to embrace the peppy candidness of the sixties. Miniskirts and minidresses were also becoming increasingly popular following Quant's influence.

With new scientific developments and discoveries, designers began to find easier access to new and revolutionary materials. Designs built on acrylics, polyester, and even PVC found its footing in the 60s, creating looks that were totally and utterly "camp", inspired by growing interest in pop art and space.

In the late 1960s, hippie fashion began to emerge, bringing with it the rise of maxi skirt. Headbands, flowing skirts, beads, and thrifted clothing began to make its mark on fashion. With such drastic changes in style over the course of this decade, fashion was now embracing originality and freedom, breaking the expectations and hegemony of high fashion.

19 Big and Bold



This decade brought anything but subtle. With oversized shapes and eye-catching patterns, 1980s fashion was like a whirlwind of styles and colours. Big hairstyles and mullets were a trend during this time as well. With shoulder pads and voluminous outerwear, standing out in a crowd with flashy outfits was adding flair. Truly, drama at its finest.

Leg warmers were initially mostly used for ballerinas to keep their legs warm during their practice. Eventually, the accessorising of the item was popularised by Jane Fonda and other fashion icons, but the trend accelerated when one of the biggest fashion icons of the decade, Madonna, adorned these in her "Hung Up" music video. This sparked people to accessorise them as aerobic wear or jeans.



Street looks were filled to the brim with fashion brands like Calvin Klein, Ralph Lauren and Giorgio Armani. This fit the common idea that most clothing was meant to flaunt status and celebrate wealth. Clothes were all just mediums to show the fabulous shades and ups of life.

20 Tacky and Wild S

As people began to lose interest in consuming products of high-end fashion brands, they turned to cheaper retail options such as Zara. With the rise of fast fashion, this era had brands cater to the mass market for affordable and accessible accessories and clothing pieces. Brands decided to shift their focus to high volume, lower quality. Tons of these garments would be manufactured, but they would not last for long in consumers' wardrobes.

The entertainment industry had the world in a chokehold over various fashion statements. Movies like Mean Girls and Legally Blonde played a huge influence on people's taste in clothing. Low-rise pants, handkerchief tops, and sequins were all popular pieces of the decade. This also went hand-in-hand with the new era of technology which everyone was obsessed with. Mini shoulder handbags and oversized hoop earrings were fun to accessorise, adding finishing touches to the outfits.



Due to the rising popularity of futuristic styles in this decade, denim saw a massive wave in consumers. And this is especially towards distressed denim or those with embroidered patterns along the material.

In some parts of the world like the United Kingdom, it became a trend for women to layer skirts over trousers. The extra layer allowed them to play with silhouettes and shape, incorporating some extra oomph to their outfits.

Y2K Revival

Fashion trends usually make a comeback in a cycle of 20 years. Look no further than this case in point: Right as the world was hit with the COVID-19 pandemic, and everything was available online at our fingertips, Y2K fashion was revived.

Thanks to the widespread audience of social media platforms such as Instagram and TikTok, influencers and even everyday ordinary person decided to get creative with their appearances for this spark in their mundane stuck-at-home life.

Wide-legged jeans, loud printed tops, knitwear and chunky jewellery are parts of the Y2K trend. With the skirts over trousers looks, influencers added their little twists for the outfit to look edgier and more appealing.

Along with the rise of vintage fashion being implemented in more outfits, thrifting for vintage and second-hand clothing items saw a massive wave. People wanted to lead a more sustainable lifestyle, concerned for the consequences of fast fashion which have damaging effects on the environment.

Clothing gives us the choice to show others how we want them to see us. We feel good about ourselves by throwing on these outfits to let the world know who we are.


preparation of ingredients

- Soak suhoon and foochuk in room temperature water. Keep it aside and let it soften.
- Cut carrots, white cabbage and sweet turnip into 5-6cm long strips.
- Trim the long beans into 5-6cm length.
- Cut the brinjal into big dice or chunks and immediately soak in salted water to avoid oxidation.
- Blend all the spice blend ingredients using a blender with a bit of water.

cooking of longtomg

- In a pot, heat up 4 tbsp of cooking oil and sauté the spice blend until fragrant.
- Add the meat item of choice and sauté for a couple of minutes.
- Add coconut milk, and bring to a boil then reduce to simmer.
- Add carrots, pounded lemongrass, and brinjal. Let it cook for 3 minutes.
- Add the rest of the ingredients and simmer until cooked. This will take about 5 minutes. Adjust the seasoning accordingly.
- Once all ingredients are cooked, serve with the garnitures.

We have conducted several initiatives with orphanages and will continue to do more where possible. The work may not be as sophisticated as compared to our corporate clients' as it focuses mainly on building an individual's confidence and goal setting, but it is truly meaningful.
- We also believe in providing a second chance at employment to those who are still able. Interestingly, this is also part of the government's initiative this year to get retirees back into the workforce wherever possible. We hope that we will be able to go the extra mile in helping those nearing retirement to better prepare for their life post-retirement, be it from a mental health standpoint or for future income and skills. We are currently working with a few partners to launch this nationwide initiative.

In retrospect, I really believe that we are blessed so we must bless others too. We came into this world with a purpose, so let us leave it a better place than it was. My dad always reminds me the concept of "just one more" or "JOM". Essentially, in everything we do, just go the extra mile and your "one extra" initiative can create a ripple effect that may be bigger than what you expected. So "JOM", let's make an impact together!

THE DISINTEGRATION OF REALITY'S FABRIC

The convergence of immersive technology and Artificial Intelligence (AI) seldom sparks excitement, despite their potential to create a science fiction-like future. Presenting my vision, I will discuss a life-changing application and an impending challenge.

Beyond the Smartphone

Despite privacy concerns, I support Meta's goal to integrate Extended Reality (XR) into our daily lives, advancing our integration with the metaverse. The metaverse is an immersive virtual shared space, allowing interactive 3D digital office meetings and 3D digital stadium experiences, mirroring physical workspaces and live events. XR enables immersion in virtual worlds like the metaverse and blending digital objects into our physical surroundings, such as summoning a holographic friend during a 'video call'.

With the debut of the Apple Vision Pro, this future appears inevitable. As the Vision Pro becomes more financially accessible, waves of Apple enthusiasts are likely to eagerly adopt it, prompting competition from other industry players. Yet, current XR headsets, including the Vision Pro and Quest 3, are bulky and have limited battery life due to the high computational demands of XR applications and processing sensor data, like eye movements or 3D mapping of the physical environment.

In the future, with advancements in wireless connectivity (WiFi 7, 5G, etc.), the need for a high-powered processor in eyewear might become obsolete. These technologies could enable us to delegate heavy computation to server computers via the internet, streaming immersive experiences directly to our retinas with negligible latency. This shift could lead to a form factor like glasses or contact lenses, offering more comfort compared to headsets, making us almost unaware of wearing them. Looking ahead, launching XR applications could be as natural as pulling out our phones from our pockets and tapping on Instagram

A New Species

I should preface this by saying that I am not referring to Artificial General Intelligence, which pertains to AI beings that are conscious and capable of independent thought. Current AI operates on pre-programmed algorithms and datadriven learning, lacking consciousness or self-determination. Instead, my focus is on AI beings convincingly human in their interactions.

Considering ChatGPT4's capability to simulate human-like text interactions, adeptly adopting various personas like "an irate, critical teacher, or a nurturing, inquisitive therapist," and coupling it with the natural-sounding voice in ChatGPT Plus voice chats, it's clear we are approaching a future where

conversing with AI closely resembles interactions with humans.

Conversely, a synthesis of advancing Al capabilities and increasingly realistic avatars is emerging. Avatar here refers to a digitally created body using computer graphics for appearance and computer animation for gestures. Channel 1, a media company, plans to unveil a newsroom in 2024 featuring Al-generated news anchors delivering personalized content. In their teaser video released on X, the anchors' appearance, voice, gestures, and the content delivered are virtually indistinguishable from real news anchors. In the future, envisioning Al beings in the metaverse, taking on roles like teachers or clinicians, indistinguishable from humans, is not unrealistic.

Personal Assistants

Exploring personal productivity with the intersection of such AI species with XR, envision the summoning a lifelike Assistant by saying 'Hey [its name]' through your XR glasses. This holographic figure, akin to a hired human personal assistant, can handle tasks like email filtering, meeting minutes, and weekly planning, among countless others.

At the 2024 Consumer Electronics Show, a significant step towards such product emerged: the Rabbit R1. Featuring a Large Action Model AI, it adeptly navigates app interfaces, executing tasks like booking a Grab, sending emails, and researching travel itineraries on your device.

Applying this concept to future metaverse navigation is feasible. An assistant could execute 'physical' tasks, like representing you in corporate meetings within the metaverse, articulating your points with fidelity. This is facilitated by a vast dataset collected from your metaverse speech, past meetings, and even calendar habits.

Silent Observers

Every interaction with AI beings, in the metaverse or our physical world, is both an asset and a potential vulnerability. Enhanced surveillance, inspired by Apple's iCloud photo scanning, could be applied in the AI domain. Surveillance algorithms may analyse user interactions with AI child avatars, reporting suspicious behaviours as a proactive measure against predatory actions. Justifying these privacy intrusions for the greater good raises debates on the societal threshold for conceding privacy in the name of collective security.

As we move toward this exhilarating future with Al beings in the metaverse, this is just one of many ethical dilemmas to face. Successfully navigating these challenges could transform our lives even more profoundly than the advent of the smartphone.
