In Defense of BookTok

Whether you are an avid reader who regularly browses bookstores and libraries, or a casual reader who prefers to peruse magazines in waiting rooms, you have probably come across BookTok more than once. Even if you do not read, if you have watched or heard of movies like *People We Meet on Vacation*, *It Ends With Us*, and *The Housemaid*, that is arguably the result of BookTok.



What is Booktok?

BookTok is a portmanteau, coming from the words “Book” and “TikTok”. BookTok is the younger, more widely known counterpart of Bookstagram (Book and Instagram). Both these online book communities focus on reviewing books, sharing recommendations and bonding over a shared love of all things written.

Bookstagram has a reputation of being slower-paced, with multipage carousels dedicated to breaking down the pros and cons of a book, offering quotes and more. Instagram also offers longer captions, which allow reviewers to go in-depth with their thoughts.

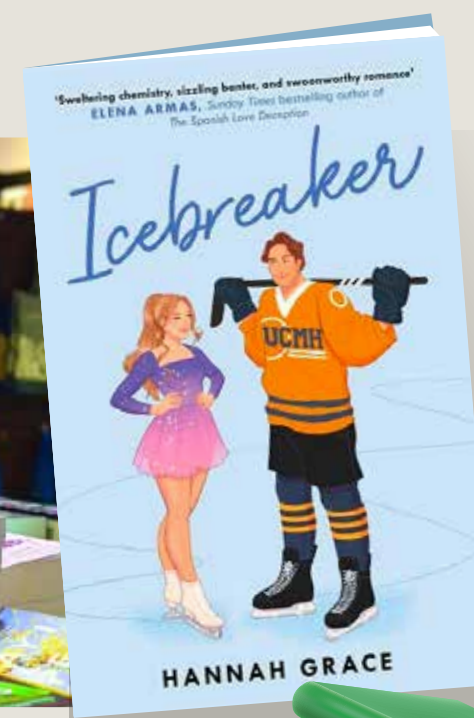
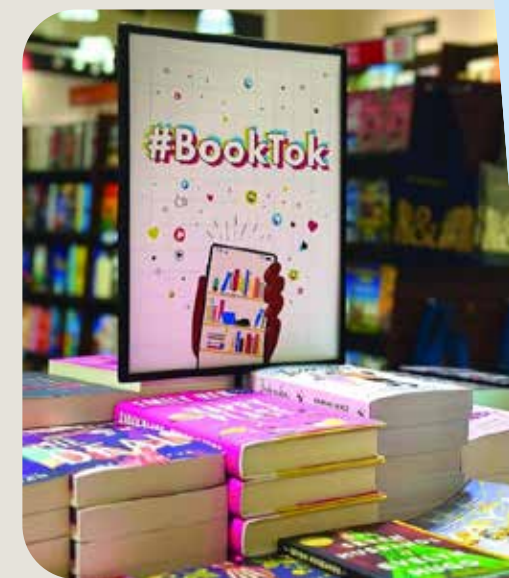
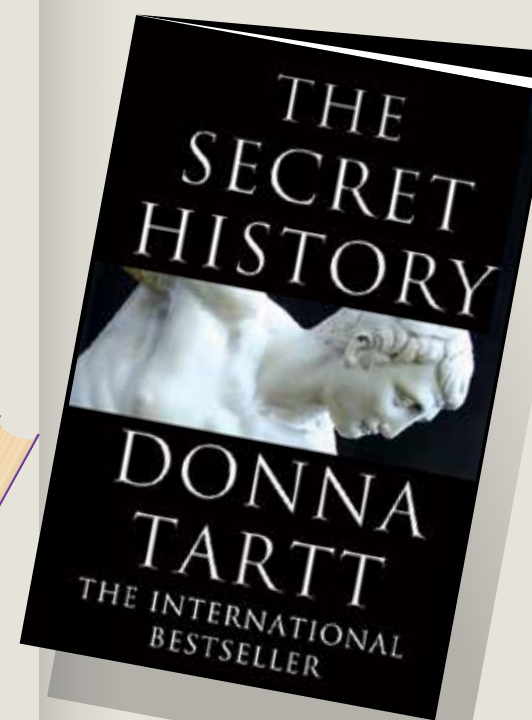
However, BookTok is its own beast. Since short-form content is favoured on TikTok, reviewers often work to compress their videos into a more bite-sized offering for our attention-deficit generation. Interestingly, BookTok has now become one of the driving forces for physical book sales. According to an article by the New York Times, BookTok helped authors sell 20 million printed books in 2021. This means that if a book goes viral on BookTok, it will likely become a bestseller.

BookTok Promoting Literary Junk?

I am not pretending that everything BookTok promotes “deserves” to become a bestseller. There is a clear difference between mere production and the art of crafting. This begs the question: Does BookTok promote the publication of “bad” books, simply because they sell well?

Capitalism demands that “the supply shall meet the demand”. If the market likes viral, easily digestible books, who are we to deny them? However, when all that the market consumes is easily digestible books, it begs the question: At what point does purchasing these books turn into mindless consumption? When a certain type of book is repeatedly promoted to users, it becomes the norm for engagement, creating somewhat of an ouroboros.

So, when BookTok viral books flood the market in droves, they blur into one another; sure, *Icebreaker* and *Wildfire* are easy to read in one sitting, but do they have any staying power? Some of them do, some of them do not, but some books are designed for immediate emotional impact rather than mindful, long-term reflection.



The BookTok Spectrum

However, claiming that BookTok is all bad is false and disingenuous. While BookTok has its flaws, it also does an important job of pushing powerful, lesser-known narratives and shaping the cultural zeitgeist. Remember the dark academia craze of the 2020s? It was partly pushed and promoted by BookTok. Without it, many people would not have known about *The Secret History* by Donna Tartt, which is now touted as a dark academia staple and a modern classic. The branch off of this includes other books like *If We Were Villains* and *Babel, or the Necessity of Violence* (one of my personal favourites) by M.L. Rio and R.F. Kuang respectively, which have both also gone viral on BookTok. Hence, this shows BookTok’s role in the revival of thematically dense works and how it continues to inspire many.

BookTok pushes different perspectives and cultures into the global market; where else would I have found out about Sally Rooney, or read about her takes on Marxism from an Irish perspective while her characters fall in and out of love? How would I have discovered Khaled Hosseini’s works about the Afghan struggle? BookTok provides users with a platform to access various forms of literature that would not be discovered otherwise, pushing lesser-known books into the mainstream, and actively shaping our modern literary landscape at large.

The Death of Nuance

In this day and age, I believe we constantly straddle a line between two extremes: taking things too seriously or not at all. In other words, the death of nuance. In this context, you could argue that reading should not be an intellectual exercise meant to perpetuate academic elitism, but a means of relaxation and enjoyment. Conversely, you could also say that reading “bad” books and encouraging their publication is the death of critical thinking and an insult to the art of writing. Both are extremes.

Instead, acknowledging BookTok as a useful distribution tool, albeit a flawed one, seems like a balanced way to move forward. BookTok reflects consumer taste, a place where book virality means success, as well as a place where gems are unearthed and brought to light. While it blurs the line between fast-paced consumerism and thoughtful reading, it still promotes reading: a slow habit in our fast-paced world, a feat that is impressive in itself. And somewhere amongst the sea of BookTok books, there is always a chance that you will find a story that lingers and inspires.

Building Spaces Where Books Find People

It is a true honour to be featured in Sunwayian Magazine and to contribute to the Leader's Log alongside individuals who are helping shape communities, industries, and ideas in meaningful ways.

The Sunway Library by BookXcess is a project that is especially close to our hearts. Although it only opened in December 2025, it already feels like a place that belongs naturally within the Sunway community. Seeing students, families, professionals, and readers gather here at all hours of the day has been deeply rewarding, and we are grateful to be part of the wider Sunway ecosystem.

For Jacqueline and me, bookstores have always been about much more than selling books.

In today's world, people no longer discover books the way they once did. We live in an age of endless digital distractions competing for our attention every second of the day. If we want reading to remain relevant, we cannot simply wait for people to find books. We must create environments where books can find people.

That philosophy became the foundation of The Sunway Library by BookXcess.

Today, it stands as the largest bookstore in Southeast Asia and Malaysia's only 24-hour bookstore. Yet what matters most is not its size. What matters is that it was designed as a space that welcomes everyone, whether they come to read, study, work, meet friends, or simply spend time surrounded by ideas.

The concept of a 24-hour bookstore emerged naturally from observing the Sunway education ecosystem. With Sunway University and many neighbouring institutions nearby, there are tens of thousands of students building their futures here. We recognised a need for a safe, comfortable, and inspiring environment where learning never has to stop because the clock says so.

In many ways, however, this story began long before The Sunway Library.

This year, BookXcess celebrates its 19th anniversary. Jacqueline and I started the business with a small bookstore in Amcorp Mall, guided by a simple but deeply personal belief: access to books should never be a privilege reserved for only a few.

Something not many people know about me is that I never completed my SPM, partly because of mild dyslexia. Those early experiences taught me an important lesson. Access to knowledge can profoundly influence a person's confidence, opportunities, and future. No child should ever feel that learning, imagination, or opportunity is beyond their reach simply because books are inaccessible.

This became the foundation for both BookXcess and the Big Bad Wolf Book Sale.

19 years later, BookXcess has grown to 22 bookstores across Malaysia and Singapore, while the Big Bad Wolf Book Sale has travelled to more than 55 cities across 17 countries.

Over the years, we have met countless readers who have told us that a single book changed the direction of their lives. Some discovered a new ambition. Some found the courage to pursue a dream.



Others found comfort during difficult periods in their lives.

Stories like these remind us that books do far more than deliver information.

Books expand perspectives.

Books build empathy.

Books strengthen voices.

Books quietly shape the people we become.

That is why spaces like The Sunway Library matter.

Looking ahead, I hope The Sunway Library by BookXcess becomes more than a bookstore. I hope it becomes a place where students discover their future passions, where families create memories together, where friendships are formed, where ideas are exchanged, and where lifelong readers are born.

Most importantly, I hope it becomes a place that reminds people that learning does not end when we leave a classroom. It is a lifelong journey.

As Sunway continues to grow as a hub for education, innovation, and community, we are proud for The Sunway Library by BookXcess to play a small part in that story.

Because ultimately, bookstores are not really about books. They are about people. And every great community deserves a place where ideas can come alive.

Lifelong Learning in Leadership

The importance of lifelong learning cannot be overstated. By continuously seeking new knowledge and skills, individuals can foster personal growth, enhance professional development, and remain adaptable in an ever-evolving world. Sunway alumna Her Excellency Cham Nimul, Cambodia's Minister of Commerce, embodies this spirit of lifelong learning through her inspiring journey with Sunway's Open and Distance Learning (ODL) programme.

For Her Excellency, the motivation to pursue further studies stemmed from a desire to continue growing intellectually while serving the community. In government office, particularly in commerce, issues such as trade, digital transformation, supply chains, entrepreneurship, and international cooperation are closely interconnected. Recognising the need for a stronger academic foundation, she sought to deepen her understanding of these complexities and strengthen her evidence-based approach to policymaking.

She was particularly drawn to Sunway's Master of Public Policy programme because of its practical focus on contemporary economic and social issues. Many of the topics explored in the programme reflected key policy issues faced by governments across Southeast Asia. The discussions on economic development, trade, governance, and evidence-based policymaking were closely aligned with Cambodia's development priorities.

Furthermore, the programme strengthened her analytical thinking and enhanced her ability to develop robust policy frameworks in a rapidly changing regional and global environment. Her studies encouraged her to evaluate policies more critically by considering available evidence, those affected by policy decisions, and their long-term implications.

Among the subjects that had the greatest impact on her was Quantitative Research Methods, which reinforced the importance of data and evidence in decision-making. Economics and trade-related subjects were especially relevant as they helped her view trade not merely as figures and agreements, but as a force that influences businesses, employment, competitiveness, and national development. The programme's strong Southeast Asian perspective also broadened her understanding of regional challenges and highlighted the value of cross-border learning.

Her studies have shaped the way she approaches trade facilitation and export diversification. Rather than focusing solely on increasing exports or attracting investment, she learned to reflect on broader questions surrounding business readiness, information access, women entrepreneurial opportunities, digital adoption, and international market standard compliance. She learned to view commerce policy not solely from the management level, but including the perspective of the businesses on the ground.

The flexible learning models offered through ODL play a vital role in expanding access to education, particularly for public servants, women leaders, and mid-career professionals. Reflecting on her own

experience, Her Excellency highlighted how Sunway's ODL mode enabled her to continue her studies from Cambodia while fulfilling her official and family responsibilities. Although balancing public office and academic commitments required effective time management, she regarded learning as an essential part of her responsibility as a public servant.

Another challenge she faced was adapting from a fast-paced decision-making environment to the reflective nature of academic learning. While government work often requires immediate responses, academic study demands critical thinking and analysis. This experience trained her ability to assess complex issues more thoughtfully and evaluate policy choices with greater depth.

She emphasised that continuous learning is a form of humility. Leadership does not mean having all the answers, but rather remaining open to new ideas, questioning assumptions, and making informed decisions based on evidence. As trade, technology, business practices, and consumers' expectations continue to evolve, leaders must complement their experience with ongoing learning to remain relevant.

In governance, lifelong learning reminds leaders to listen, consult, evaluate evidence, and adapt when circumstances change. Strong leadership is defined not only by authority but also by sound judgment and a commitment to serving people effectively. For economic leadership, learning helps leaders identify risks and opportunities clearly, enabling the development of policies that are practical, inclusive, and forward-looking. She

highlighted that, above all, policy is about people, livelihoods, businesses, and the future.

Ultimately, Her Excellency hopes her journey will inspire women, particularly young and working professionals, to continue investing in their personal and professional growth. She believes that learning should never cease, regardless of one's stage in life or leadership journey. Beyond expanding knowledge, education has the power to transform how individuals think, lead, and contribute meaningfully to society.

Her Excellency was awarded the Sunway Distinguished Alumni Award 2025, which recognises the remarkable accomplishments of alumni who have distinguished themselves in their chosen fields, professions, or the community, and whose endeavours reflect admirably on and bring honour to the Sunway institutions.

We understand that you may be the only Malaysian accepted into Harvard so far in 2026, how does that feel?

It feels quite surreal to have been accepted to Harvard, especially as the only student from my cohort to receive an offer. What makes the acceptance particularly meaningful to me is that everything I pursued outside the classroom came from genuine interest rather than a strategy for university admissions. While I do wish more Malaysians had received offers this year, I am proud of what this represents beyond my own achievement. I hope it encourages students across Malaysia who may feel that they are "not good enough" to consider applying.

What do you think sets you apart in your applications?

I think what helped me most was simply enjoying my school experience. Universities value a well-rounded education, and I spent my time exploring a wide range of interests, from Olympiad competitions and academic organisations to performing in the 24 Festive Drums. Doing well academically is important, but what is often missing from a more formulaic approach is passion. Kindness, generosity, and the ability to connect with others matter more than people often realise. I also believe it is important to let your personality come through. While I have a strong academic and competitive side, authenticity and individuality go a long way.

Do you have any tips you would like to share with others?

My advice is to avoid centering your entire life around university applications. Focus on doing what you love. Remember that taking the first step is what truly counts. You never know what might be possible until you try. As the saying goes, "belum cuba, belum tahu," you will never know unless you give it a chance. Trusting the process is important, and Malaysian students are often far more capable and resilient than they give themselves credit for.

What made you choose Sunway College?

The scholarships offered at Sunway are truly unmatched. Some lecturers bring decades of experience, and that level of expertise is clearly reflected in the quality of teaching. The support system has been exceptional, especially when I had to travel abroad for Olympiads. My lecturers have consistently gone the extra mile to help me catch up on missed content, often on their own time. I have also really valued the mentor-mentee system, which made the university application process far more collaborative and manageable.

How has your experience at Sunway College shaped your perspective and contributed to where you are today?

I have absolutely no regrets about choosing Sunway College. Can you tell us how your passion for writing first began, and what inspired you to start creating your own stories?

I've always found it easier to write things down than say them out loud. My brain tends to overthink everything, so writing became a way to organise all those thoughts into something that actually makes sense. It started with reading when I was younger, which quickly turned into a "I'm going to write a book one day" phase. That eventually became short fiction stories for fun (I can't promise any of them were particularly good, haha), but it sparked my love for creating stories and sharing ideas.

What writing do you enjoy most, and how would you describe your personal writing style?



Fiction is probably my favourite because it gives me complete creative freedom. As an A-Level humanities student going into Law, most of my writing follows a structure, so fiction feels like a chance to make up the rules for once. My writing style depends on where I'm writing. For the *Sunwayian* magazine, I like to keep things light-hearted and engaging while still talking about meaningful topics. On my personal blog, though, it's usually a mix of reflections, observations, and the occasional passionate rant about things that probably didn't need to bother me as much as they did.

As a contributor to Sunwayian, what has been the most rewarding part of seeing your work published?

Definitely people's reactions. I never really announce when I've written something, so I usually just hand the magazine to my parents and watch their reaction. Seeing how proud they are never gets old. One moment that really stood out was when a student I'd never met before messaged me on Teams after reading my women's day article to say she found it relatable. Knowing that something I wrote connected with a complete stranger was a really rewarding feeling.

How has the Sunwayian helped you develop your confidence and skills as a writer?

It's made me much more confident about sharing my work. Before, I'd spend forever second-guessing every sentence. Now, I'm more willing to put my writing out there and trust that it will find the right audience. Seeing my work published all pretty and professional, and receiving feedback has also reminded me that writing isn't just about what I want to say—it's about connecting with other people too.

How do you hope to continue your writing journey, and what advice would you give to other students who are interested in sharing their creative work?

I currently write on my Substack, *Unstabiya*. I don't post on a strict schedule, but I enjoy having a space where I can keep sharing my thoughts and ideas. For anyone thinking about sharing their creative work, I'd say just go for it. It's normal to feel nervous, but seeing your work published and knowing people are reading it is incredibly fulfilling. You never know who might connect with what you've created until you put it out there.

My interpretation of *otak otak* draws inspiration from a traditional Mesoamerican dish known as *tamales*, humble parcels of seasoned filling wrapped in corn husks and cooked with quiet patience. This idea reveals how food cultures can resonate with one another across different regions of the world.

Often regarded as one of Malaysians' favourite dishes, *otak otak* is a dish that highlights our pride in local spices and ingredients. Fragrant fish custard, enriched with fresh aromatics such as turmeric, chilies, lemongrass, and candlenut, along with creamy coconut milk, is carefully wrapped in corn husk instead of the usual banana or attap leaves. Each fold is intentional, each parcel carrying both tradition and creativity.

When grilled, the husk gently dries and chars, releasing a warm, earthy aroma that blends beautifully with the smokiness of the fire. As the custard cooks, it sets delicately while remaining soft and moist, infused with layers of spice and herbal fragrance. The first bite is silky and tender, followed by a gentle heat, a savoury sweetness from the seafood, and a lingering smokiness on the palate.

Choosing corn husk is not only a culinary expression but also a sustainable one. It serves as a natural, biodegradable wrapper that preserves moisture and enhances flavour while reducing reliance on synthetic materials. This approach embraces the use of whole ingredients, transforming what is often overlooked into something meaningful and refined.

For me, this dish represents continuity, where traditional Malaysian flavours meet global inspiration, where time honoured techniques remain relevant in contemporary kitchens, and where sustainability is not an added concept but something that has always been present within our culinary heritage.

Spice Paste

- 1 red chilly
- ½ red onion
- 1 lemon grass (white part)
- 1 candlenut
- 1-inch fresh turmeric
- 5g coriander seed, toasted

Using a mortar and pestle, pound all the ingredients into a smooth paste. Alternatively, you may blend using an electric blender.

Otak Otak



Fish Paste

- Spice paste
- 1 egg
- 10ml coconut milk
- 10 corn flour
- 5g sugar
- 5g salt
- 200g Spanish mackerel

Add in egg, coconut milk, corn flour, sugar, and salt into the spice paste. Add in half of the mackerel fish and continue to blend until smooth in texture. Then add in the remaining mackerel fish and pulse blend slightly for a coarser texture. Remove from the blender and keep aside in the chiller for 15 minutes.

To assemble

Corn husks
Oil

Clean corn husk and wipe dry. Brush a thin layer of oil on the corn husk and place about 2 tablespoons of the fish paste at the centre. Fold the long sides of the husk covering the paste and another side on top. A long strip will be achieved with the paste at the centre. Then, fold in both the left and right-side inwards. Tie it with a piece of corn husk to secure the folded ends.

Cooking

Heat up a grilled pan until slightly warm. Place the folded fish paste on the pan and cook for 5-8 minutes. Repeat on the other side until the fish paste is cooked through.



Made by Malaysians

As we celebrate Merdeka, it is a fitting time to reflect on the many achievements that have shaped our nation. Among them are the remarkable inventions created by Malaysians, innovations that showcase our creativity, ingenuity, and pioneering spirit.



Nehemiah Wall

A common feature along Malaysia's highways, the hexagonal-patterned Nehemiah Wall is a homegrown engineering innovation developed by Johor-born engineer Nehemiah Lee in 1993. The patented retaining wall system supports flyovers and embankments, offering a durable and cost-effective construction solution. By 2015, over 1.5 million square metres had been built across Malaysia, with the technology also expanding to countries such as Singapore, Sri Lanka, Bangladesh, and India.

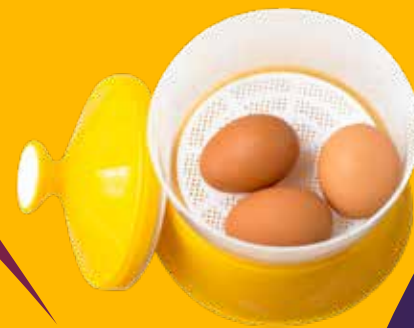
Biometric Passports

Malaysia made history in 1998 as the first nation to introduce an electronic passport. Developed by homegrown technology company IRIS Corporation, the groundbreaking e-passport incorporated a microchip capable of storing biometric information, including facial images and thumbprints. Launched five years before the International Civil Aviation Organization established global e-passport standards in 2003, this innovation positioned Malaysia at the forefront of secure travel technology. Today, the Malaysian e-passport remains a testament to the country's pioneering spirit in technological advancement.



Egg Boiler

Perfectly cooked half-boiled eggs, a beloved Malaysian breakfast staple, became easier to enjoy thanks to an invention by Datuk Hew Ah Kow. Inspired by his frustration with overcooked eggs while working at a lumber camp in Kelantan in 1973, he spent a year experimenting to find the ideal water-to-egg ratio. His simple yet effective device consistently produced perfectly soft-boiled eggs and was later sold as a prototype for RM7,000.



Surgical Face Mask

Long before face masks became an everyday essential during the COVID-19 pandemic, a Malaysian doctor pioneered their use in modern medicine. In 1910, Penang-born epidemiologist Dr Wu Lien-teh developed the world's first surgical face mask while combating the deadly Manchurian Plague in China. Made from layers of cotton and gauze, the mask helped prevent the airborne disease from spreading and laid the foundation for the protective masks used around the world today.



Sustainable Animal Feed

At just 11 years old, Maryam Muzamir from Kuantan, Pahang, developed Yam 2.0, a sustainable livestock feed made from discarded seafood shells such as shrimp and sea snail shells. Designed to reduce food waste, her invention gained international attention and was even featured on The Late Late Show with James Corden. Maryam has since earned multiple accolades at the International Invention Innovation Competition in Toronto, including a gold medal, the Canadian Special Award, and the Best Young Inventor Award.

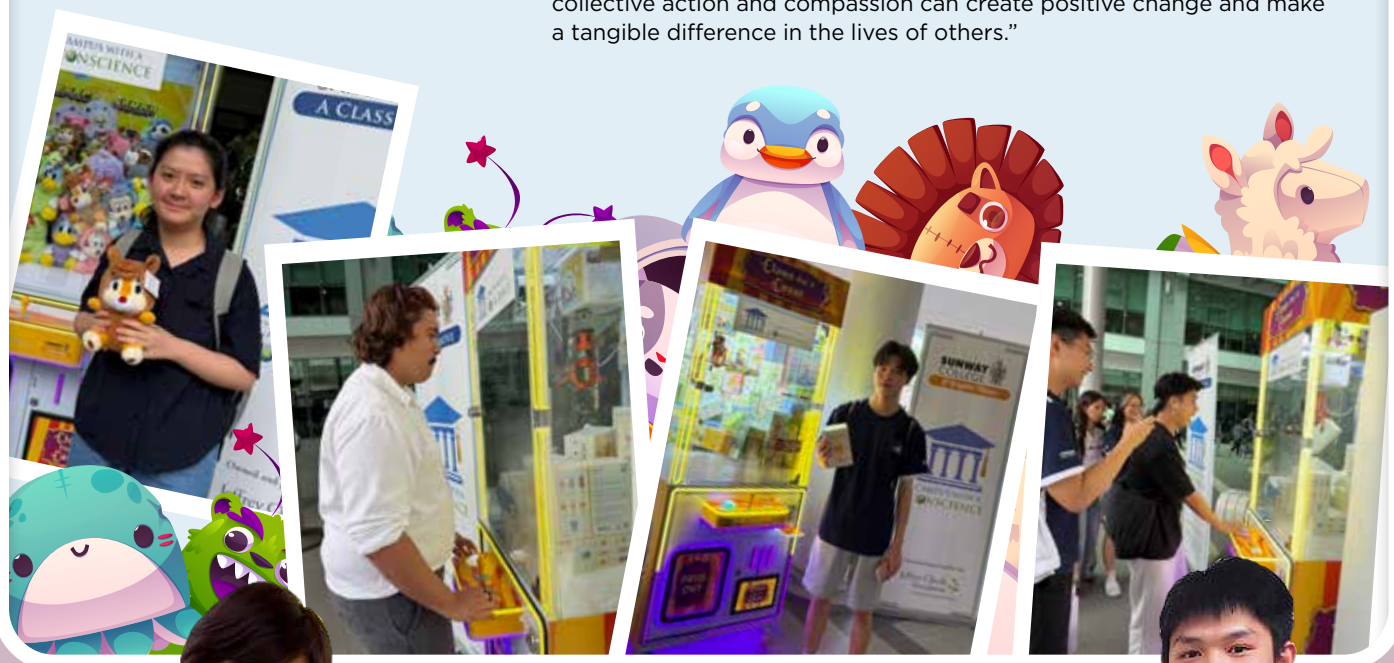


Claws for A Cause
